Japanese culture comes to Kirkwall

Library and Archive enjoyed an experience of all things Japanese on Saturday.

The day was hailed as a huge success, as crowds turned up to try their hand at origami and calligraphy.

Face painting and Japanese dress were part of the pro-gramme, and there was also the chance to experience a taste of Japan, quite literally, with an assortment of food and drink available.

Hibiki Shamisen — a spellbinding performance by

master Hibiki shamisen Ichikawa, together with folk song and blues singer Akari Mochizuki — also took place in the morning.

The duo told the story of

how the shamisen — a three-stringed instrument — came to Japan over 300 years ago, and played some songs especially for Children's Day, which is celebrated in Japan every May 5.

There was standing room only in the MacGillivray Room of the library, as JKA Orkney Karate Club also gave a demonstration of their skills in

Club instructor Andrew Hamilton gave a short talk on the history of karate and the local club, before a dozen members, ranging from white belt to fourth dan, demonstrated a range of kihon (basic techniques), kumite (sparring),

and kata (set forms).
